Forty-two teenage members of the Moment Musicals gathered at

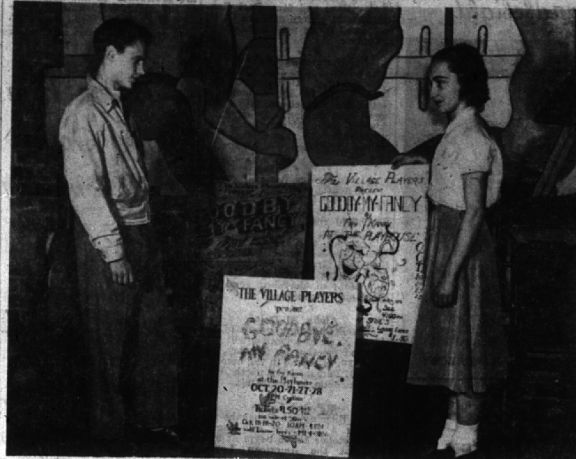

Nikolaidi returned to Athens where she gave recitals and appeared as Carmen eight times within a fortnight. Later the same autumn she gave her first London recital in Wigmore Hall. Following this concert, she was offered a year's contract to remain in England to sing with the Covent Garden Opera company. She was obliged to turn down this offer because of previous commitments in the United States.

THE SINGER is married to Thamos Mellos, whom she met while they both were students at the Athens conservatory. While in Vienna, Mellos taught and coached voice but now devotes much of his time to managing the musical affairs of his wife.

Other artists to appear during the 1950-51 season include Nikolai and Joanna Graudan, cello and piano duo; Ricardo Odjapsoff, violinist; Clifford Curzon, pianist; and Men of Song, male quartet.

Elena Nikolaidi To Appear In 1st Community Concert

Elena Nikolaidi, Greek contralto will be the first artist to be presented this season under the Community Concert association of Southern Oakland county. This concert will be held Tuesday evening, October 17, at 8:15 p.m., in the auditorium of the Royal Oak High school.

Miss Nikolaidi was born in a small town near Athens, Greece and inherited her musical gifts from her father who was an independent teacher and professor of Byzantine music. When she was fifteen she sang for the directors of the Athens Conservatory and was awarded a six-year scholarship granted through the University of Athens.

the conservatory, the young contralto made her official debut as soloist with the State Orchestra, Dimitri Mitropoulos, conducting. Soon after her graduation she appeared at the Athens Lyric theater in "Carmen" and "Samson and Delilah."

In 1936, the Greek government, at the suggestion of Mitropoulos, selected Miss Nikolaidi from other applicants for a scholarship to study in Vienna.

Then followed an audition for Bruno Walter, at that time director of the Vienna State opera. He immediately engaged her for the role of Princess Eboli in "Don Carlos", which opened the 1936 season.
