Harry L. Winston, President of Boys' Republic, Named 'Volunteer-of-Week'

The volunteer work of Harry L. Winston, 488 Aspen, has quite an interesting history behind it. His work and silent support of Boys' Republic during the past years is part of that history. He is the Central Volunteer Bureau's Red Feather "Volunteer-of-the-Week."

One of the original founders of the Republic was Sara Krolik. As it happens, she was Mr. Winston's grandmother, and thus he is carrying on the family tradition.

Added to this, was the active volunteer work of the late Fred Butzel, a law-partner and friend of Harry Winston, also one of the founders of Boys' Republic. Boys' Republic is a school for problem boys and was established in 1907. Its program is unique and effective in working with emotionally disturbed, delinquent boys. They are between the ages of 14 and 17, and are committed by the juvenile courts.
