Baldwin Reserves Lose to Waterford

Playing their first scheduled game in two years the Birmingham reserves lost to Waterford reserves 24-13 last week at Pierce field.

In the first minutes Henry Moore, Birmingham back, received the kickoff on the 12 yard line and ran it back to the 40. After three first downs, with Birmingham on the seven yard line, Fred Eavis, Maple back, drove through the line for the first counter. The try for extra point was blocked and the score stood 6-0.

WATERFORD received the kick and ran it back to the 33 yard line. In four first downs the visitors drove to the Birmingham one, from which Joe Hubbel went through the line for Waterford's first score. The try for conversion failed, and the score was tied.

In the second quarter, Birmingham's John Hardin recovered Waterford's fumble on the 15. With the ball on the three, Eavis again crossed the goal for the Maple. His try for point was good, making the score 13-6.

IN THE THIRD quarter Gregor threw a 30 yard pass to Bud Wheeler who went over for a Waterford score. The extra point failed but Waterford led 18-13. Gregor made a 12 yard run around left end for Waterford's fourth and final score in the last stanza.

John Simonds, coach of the Birmingham reserves, blamed poor defense in the first half and fumbles in the second for the loss. He was pleased that the team did its own thing since Waterford reserves beat Rochester reserves 51-0.

School Conference Attended by Three From Birmingham

Attending the conference of the Southeastern Michigan college agreement schools last weekend at St. Mary's Lake, Battle Creek, were Larned G. Goodrich; boys' counselor, Duncan Helmrich, social studies and Joe Bachman, president of Baldwin student congress.

Others attending the conference were representatives of 22 secondary schools, the University of Michigan, Wayne University, Michigan State Normal College, the state superintendent of public instruction, and the metropolitan Detroit bureau of cooperative school studies. Seven students in member schools were also participants.

Topics discussed were core of common learning; guidance, staff planning; follow-up studies of students; grouping students in required subjects; student participation in school government; Michigan college's second party school agreement; and techniques of teacher-pupil planning.

About 130 schools belonging to this agreement, have signed contract with the Michigan colleges. The purpose of the member schools and colleges is the improvement of education in the secondary schools of this area.
