Dunstan Players Open With Comedy "Born Yesterday"

From the time that Harry Brock, millionaire junk man, walks into his \$225 a day hotel suite and takes off his shoes until his dumb blonde walks out of it with her chest on, events of an entertaining and exciting nature took place last Friday evening to the evident satisfaction of a large audience witnessing the St. Dunstan's Guild presentation of "Born Yesterday."

This Garson Kanin comedy of Washington business and political schematists, which played for so long on Broadway is having its first amateur presentation in these arts with a thoroughly competent cast directed by Jervis B. McEachern.

THE STORY is a variation of the Pygmalion theme with the action taking place in suite 67D, a large part of the best hotel in Washington, D. C.

Harry Brock, junk man extraordinaire, has moved in to take over the United States Senate if necessary to accomplish his next big coup but he makes the mistake of thinking that "the people" in the form of a chorus girl "born yesterday" will be content to be not to embarrass him socially and still not use her mind to distinguish right from wrong. As you might suspect, she learns the correct answers from a young newspaper man who is hired to teach her and before the final curtain she takes over in a big way.

MRS. ROY LEITCH does an outstanding job in her portrayal of Billie Dawn, the ex-chorus girl who is educated up to a point where she understands enough big words to know that she is unwittingly a part of the biggest swindle since "tea-pot" something. She authentically develops the class of character as education progresses and neatly handles the laugh lines with which the play so richly endows her.

Top honors should be shared by Weston Meyer as Harry Brock who is educated up to a point where he runs his business at the top of his voice but "trickles" in the family he occasionally drops into tough vernacular that is characteristic of a junk tycoon.

W. H. ADAMS, JR., as the crusading newspaper man who takes over the \$200 a week job of teaching Billie to read a book, furnishes an excellent contrast to point up the moral values which Mr. Kanin hammers home during the fooling and laughs.

Jack Sanders and Dr. Dwight Ensign are about as unscrupulous a pair of rogues as have turned up in many a day, as a consistently besotted shyster lawyer and the Senator from Noghers.

THE PRINCIPALS are well supported by Mrs. Ensign as the senator's wife (who smokes a cigarette like nobody else in the world); William Comstock, a dead pan cousin of the Big Shot; and the usual swank hotel retinue of assistant manager, bell hops, manicurist, bootblack and a barber that can shave a customer on stage and make it look real.

In these roles are Carl McLean, Jr., Richard Pace, Richard Gray, Tommy Bell and Wag Wright. An outstanding feature of the inter-
