

**Machus Bakery Enlarges Facilities**

Dr. Wood speaks at annual clinic

DES MOINES, Ia.—Dr. John P. Wood, 131 Lyonhurst, Birmingham, Mich., spoke at the twenty-third annual clinical assembly of the American College of Osteopathic Surgeons and allied organizations at the Hotel Savery, Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 15-19.

Dr. Wood, who is staff chairman of the Detroit Osteopathic hospital collaborated with Dr. Charles L. Karbo of Detroit in discussion of "Developmental Defects of the Skeletal System and Their Orthopedic Management."

This subject was presented to a combined session of the American Osteopathic College of Radiology and the American Osteopathic Academy of Orthopedics.

A past president of the American Osteopathic association, Dr. Wood is now a member of its board of directors.

**Second Speaker**

There were 20 traffic violations indicated in the 21 accidents recorded in Birmingham during the month of September, according to Ralph W. Moxley, police chief.

Chief Moxley pointed out that September also saw the city's first fatal accident of the year, brought about by a "minor" violation.

"The result of this accident illustrates the possible seriousness of a so-called 'minor violation,'" Moxley said. "It proves clearly that a 'minor violation' does not exist

when circumstances dictate otherwise."

Moxley added that the only violation of a traffic sign or signal in the city during September was the one involving this fatal accident in which Alan F. McGirr was killed.

THE REPORT showed also that six persons were injured during the month.

Following other cars too closely and making improper turns were the largest contributing factors in the month's accident toll, each accounting for five.

Four were caused by violation of the right of way and one each by the driver not leaving the car under control, drunken driving, excessive speed and improper starting from a parked position.
