
Harrison agreed to this arrangement before the commission would approve an area plat for recording.



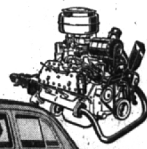
