### Big Bear Seeks Rezoning of East Half Of Block to Permit Further Parking

Birmingham's new Big Bear market on S. Woodward has asked the city to rezone the eastern half of its block from residential to a business classification to permit further off-street parking facilities.

While agreeing that this rezoning was perhaps the best use for the land immediately east of the new market, city commissioners decided to ask for the city plan commission's recommendation on the move before further action is taken.

Mayor Bruce C. Booth pointed out that he didn't believe residences would be constructed on the lots, but that residents in the area might not approve of rezoning unless the parking could be made permanent.

HE SUGGESTED that possibly a new zoning classification "for parking purposes only" might be the answer.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert advised that the plan commission is considering such a classification in its revised zoning ordinance now under study.

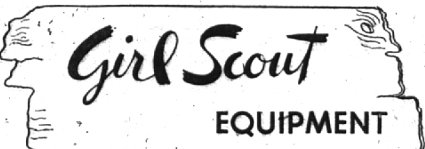
