Ronald Thompson is senior crew leader; Ken Fowler, secretary.



Incorporation Plans Concern Southfield Board

Members of the Southfield township board and planning commission expressed great concern Tuesday evening over the proposed plan of the residents of the south-east section of the township to incorporate as a city.

The board approved the hiring of attorney Julius Seider for the purpose of rendering an opinion as to what action it can take to stop the incorporation now proposed of the city of Southfield Park.

Positions for incorporation have already been filed with the county clerk. Territory for the proposed city is bounded by Eight mile on the south; 200 feet south of Mt. Vernon road (9 1/2 Mile road) on the north; Greenfield on the east; and Plum Hollow Golf club on the west. Incorporation would not include Magnolia and Westhampton subdivisions.

Richard Larson, planning commission member, said he objected to the incorporation because the proposed city was not well planned, especially objected to the uneven boundaries.

Some board members expressed concern over the possibility of various sections starting separate cities. Redford and Royal Oak townships were cited as examples. Supervisor D. P. Frame requested the planning commission to get the opinions of township residents on the proposed incorporation. Supervisor D. P. Framen W. D. McMaisters, resident of various sections and also a planning commission member, said his subdivision "is happy as a member of the township" and sees no reason to pull away.

IN OTHER BUSINESS. Mark Cheever of the Beverly Hills association, requested township action against Foss Lake Trailer park.

He said the area is detrimental to the nearby property and pointed out that smoke from burning rubbish is odorous and dangerous to Southfield health.

Supervisor D. P. Frame said nothing can be done about the appearance of the property, but if the trailer park is violating an ordinance or is a health menace something can be done.

The board approved hiring legal counsel to determine whether the park is violating a zoning ordinance and whether it has a case. It also authorized the attorney to bring necessary legal action if in his opinion there is a violation.

The township dog warden was given a \$90 a month salary raise. He has been receiving \$2000 a year plus commissions.



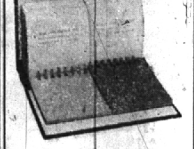
