**A.A.U.W. Chairmen Announce Results Of 23rd Book Sale**

Mrs. Gilbert Gove, general chairman of the AAUW annual book sale, and Mrs. John Q. Holmes, sales chairman, have announced the results of last week's sale.

At Sunday's preview sale, open only to schools and libraries, of the vicinity, and financed by the group's "anonymous donor's gift," 773 books, 325 magazines and 57 records were purchased, plus miscellaneous items.

Records of the public sale, totaling approximately \$1230, show that 5,561 books, 726 magazines and 183 records were sold. Other miscellaneous items, such as games, toys, sheet music and patterns were also available.

At the close of the sale, 2900 books remained, all readable material. These were packed and sent to veterans hospitals in Oakland County Mental Hospital, Old People's home, Star Commonwealth and the Oakland County Children's home.

Mrs. Gove further stated that the Association is already collecting books for next year's 24th annual sale, as no books are held over from another year.

### Chinese Visitor Studies Social Work of Area

Mrs. Phoebe Y. O. Lee of Hong Kong, China, was spending last week as the house guest of Mrs. Arthur McLeod of Dorchester road. Mrs. Lee returned to this country recently, after a 21-year absence, to visit college friends made at the University of Michigan, where she studied for five years.

Mrs. Lee, whose father was a graduate of Syracuse university and is the first Chinese to be Methodist Bishop of China, is now Hong Kong director of the Family Welfare Society.

**SHE AND HER husband**, a New York born Chinese architect and graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, with their four children, were in the war-torn city of Hong Kong for six months.

Mrs. Lee explained that, in order to maintain her children's American citizenship, she must send them to schools in the United States for five years, before they reach the age of 21. Two of her daughters, 15 and 18 years, are now attending a Kentucky preparatory school and later will enter the University of Michigan. Her other two children, 8 and 12, she has had to leave in China for three years.

**WHILE VISITING HERE**, Mrs. Lee spoke to many groups in the Detroit area and is now on her way to New York, where she will spend a month before leaving for Great Britain.

She will spend two months as the guest of the British Consulate in London and Scotland, where she will study their methods of social welfare work.

She also spent part of last week visiting her high school teacher, Miss France, who recently was sent back to China to work with other Chinese educators, who did not conform to the Communist movement.

**MRS. LEE** made a survey of welfare work in Detroit, as part of her study of social welfare agencies in the United States, England and Scotland.

Mrs. Lee's agency, the Hong Kong Family Welfare Society, a voluntary group of seven case workers, is one of 57 social agencies in the city.

While visiting her friends here, Mrs. Lee entertained her hostess and her family to a surprise dinner of her native Chinese dishes.

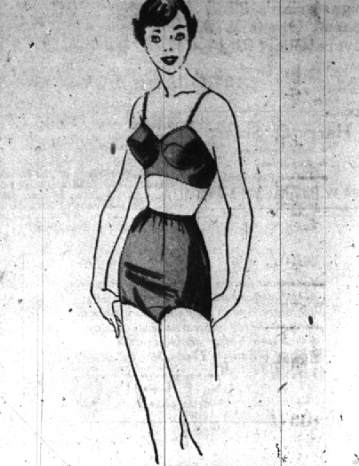
