Troy School Head Announces Report On Debt Status

A report on the debt condition of the Troy township school district since the consolidation two years ago, was made this week by Stuart K. Baker, superintendent of schools. The debt has been reduced at the time of consolidation to \$114,000 at the present time.

Debts of school districts in the township at the time of consolidation were: Troy Union, \$81,000; Troy No. 2, \$11,000; Colerain, \$18,000; Big Beaver, \$96,000; and Log Cabin, \$25,000.

DEBTS AT THE present time are Troy Union, \$7,000; Troy No. 2, none; Colerain, none; Big Beaver, \$68,000; and Log Cabin, \$21,000.

Baker said bonds of Troy No. 2, Colerain and Troy Union have been retired because the interest rate was higher than on Big Beaver and Log Cabin bonds.

The superintendent stated that the board of education plans to retire \$20,000 on the above bonds. While attending Birmingham high school, he was captain of the baseball and football teams and a member of the basketball squad.

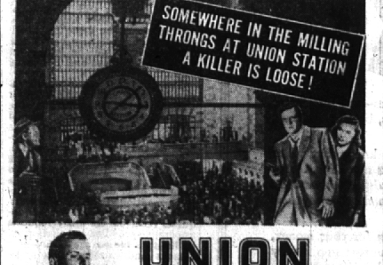

There are openings for unlimited enlistments in the Navy and Marine Corps for young men in charge of the Navy Recruiting Station in Postfach, announced today.

He said reactivation of the moth ball fleet plus heavier Navy commitments provide opportunity for advancement for young men between the ages of 17 and 31 who wish to enlist now.

Those with previous Navy service during World War II can defer their next Navy duty from their present age to bring them within the age brackets.

Enlisted members of the Army Organized Reserve Corps with four or more dependents will not be ordered active duty in the future without their consent. It was announced today by Major T. M. Dickinson, Michigan Military District.

Orders already issued to re-examine in this category who have not yet reported for duty will be rescinded.

Those who have four or more dependents and are already on active duty in the United States will be discharged immediately, Major Dickinson said.

Decision to discharge men with four or more dependents was made by the Army because present family allowance laws provide a maximum allowance for three dependents.

THUS, A soldier with four or more dependents receives an allowance no larger than that of a soldier with three dependents.

Enlisted men who desire to be discharged under this plan must execute sworn affidavits listing four or more dependents. The soldier is discharged from active duty and from the Organized Reserve Corps after affidavits have been accepted as proof of dependency.

Wives, children and dependent parents, provided a parent received more than half of his or her support from the soldier, are the only relatives who may be listed as dependents.

Hawaiian Display At Cranbrook Institute

Among the current exhibits at Cranbrook is one of the native arts, tapa cloths, and the tools used to make them, idols and games of ancient Hawaii.

Much of this material was brought back from the islands by Dr. Seth Andrews, of Romeo, Mich. Dr. Andrews served as medical missionary from 1836 to 1848. The display is shown through the courtesy of his grandson, Charles E. Potter and will remain at the institute until mid-January.

Besides native crafts of woodwork, basketry, what ivory, stone and shell items are early carvings of the islands and newspapers printed in the Hawaiian language.

Navy Reservist On Way Home from Caribbean Cruise

HAVANA, CUBA, Oct. 23—Lt. (jg) Philip Bumeyer II, USNR, husband of Mrs. Leon T. Bretmeyer, 1866 Humphrey, Birmingham, Mich., is back aboard ship today making ready to sail for home after two days of liberty in this beautiful old city of 602 miles south of New Orleans.

He is with 100 reserve blue-jackets who swarmed ashore here Saturday for recreation after a week of clockwork drill at sea.

They are on annual two week active fleet training with two New Orleans-based 2,200-ton destroyers, the Compton and the Dickson.

THE SHIPS will get underway this morning, and reservists will resume simulated war maneuvers in the Caribbean on the last leg of their cruise.

Trainees will disembark Oct. 30 at New Orleans, and catch trains, planes and buses for home over the weekend.

We Heard It Said By:—

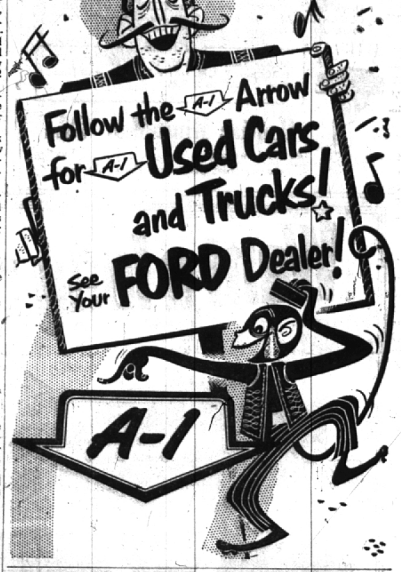
