The second "God and Country Award" earned by a Birmingham Boy Scout will be presented next Sunday to Explorer-Eagle Scout Richard W. Emery. The first award was won by his brother, Glenn M. Emery, Jr., last year. The presentation is being made by the First Church of Christ, Scientist. Dick, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn E. Emery, 311 E. Southlawn, is a member of Troop B-1, sponsored by the Men's Club of the First Presbyterian church. The award may be earned by a registered Boy Scout, of Protestant denomination who has a useable and workable understanding of the Bible. The requirements include a minimum of 150 hours of personal service to the Scout's individual church. James R. Buchanan, chairman of District 1, Detroit area council, speaking of Dick's accomplishment, said: "In completing the requirements for this award a boy has contributed materially to his church, community and his own standing as a future citizen. The Boy Scouts of America maintain that no boy can grow into the best kind of a citizen without realizing his obligation to God. "Similar awards are available to churches in all faiths through a program carried on in the boy's own church under directors of the officials. Thus emphasis is placed on the relationship of the Boy Scout and his religious advisor."
