YMCA Enrollment Drive Still Lags

The local YMCA membership drive is continuing to lag behind last year's pace, according to Young C. Smith, general chairman of the drive.

Latest reports show only 250 new and renewed members have signed up, and a total of \$600 in cash turned in on the current membership enrollment.

Smith blamed the slowness of the campaign to the inability of workers to find people at home plus the early campaign dates, which are two weeks in advance of last year's.

The goal is 500 new and renewed members and \$2,000 in cash. Last year 502 persons were enrolled and \$1,600 in cash raised.

An up-to-date report of progress of the campaign is displayed in Shain's store window. Smith said weekly campaign bulletins have been mailed to all canvassers. The drive will last two more weeks.

Ferdale Police Arrest Men Wanted For Local Robbery

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said Monday that Ferdale police were holding two men who had confessed the Friday evening robbery of the H. F. Salich home, 1160 West Lincoln.

William Coons, 26, of Ferdale and James Madonia, 23, of Hazel Park were quoted by officers as having said they entered the Salich home about 6:30, remaining there from 30 to 45 minutes.

The men said they gathered their loot together, took it to the garage and then drove in the driveway to load it into the car.

The stolen property included a shot gun, rifle, camera, radio, power lawn mower, jewelry and clothing, valued at over \$500.

Several items already recovered have been identified by Salich.

MOXLEY SAID the two were arrested by Ferdale police for carrying concealed weapons, after they had tried to sell part of the stolen property to some young woman in a Woodward avenue restaurant.

The men, according to Moxley, are also wanted by police in Saginaw and Toledo, Ohio.
