Plan Commissioners Outline Some of City's Problems to Rotarians

Four city plan commissioners spoke briefly to Birmingham Rotarians at their Monday noon luncheon on some of the problems which the commission is studying.

Plan Commission Chairman Mrs. Peter B. Loomis emphasized that the commission strongly encourages citizens to communicate their comments to the commission regarding its present and future proposals.

"No matter how well we plan our work, or how wise it is, it will not be carried out unless every one understands it and wants it," she said.

Elliott S. Kinney commented on the non-political nature of the plan commission.

"We have no political commitments or talents—we are impartial and trying our best to do a good job for all of Birmingham," he said.

HOW THE COMMISSION processes zoning requests was outlined by Harry Denyes, Jr., and Robert G. Mason touched on the subject of the city's sewer problems.

"By annexation of various areas, the city has acquired a hodge-podge of sewer developments," Mason declared.

"Some of them try to run up hill, some are too small, and others are not at the right angle for the best flow. These situations will eventually have to be corrected."

He sharply criticized the state stream control board for pressuring Birmingham into over-enlarging its present sewerage disposal plant.

"I THINK THE state should be concerned first with communities like Oak Park which permit raw sewage to flow onto Royal Oak streets, rather than make Birmingham spend millions of dollars to take care of a much less serious pollution problem," he said.

Fletcher Renton of Royal Oak, district governor for Rotary, will visit the local club officially next week. He will be the luncheon speaker.
