Registration for students at Kingswood and Cranbrook schools was held Monday and Tuesday. All classes at these schools and at Brookside school were in full session on Wednesday.

Marion E. Goodie, headmistress of Kingswood, has announced the addition of four new members to the faculty.

The new dean of residence, Dorothy Ingles of Detroit, received her degree last June from the University of Michigan where she was student assistant at Stockwell hall.

Elizabeth Bousfield of Bay City will be an assistant in sports. She also graduated from the University of Michigan last June and served as president of the Women's Athletic association during her senior year.

HESTER GOODENOUGH who lives in Woodbridge, Conn., will teach history at Kingswood. She graduated from Smith college last June, magna cum laude.

Another Detroit girl, Nancy Wolfner who graduated from Kingswood in 1946 and is a 1950 graduate of Smith college, cum laude, will be director of study halls and teach in the history department.

Grace Fry who has been at the school since its founding will be the assistant headmistress.

Art Reproductions Being Shown Here During School Year

Opening a series of 100 reproductions of famous paintings to be shown Birmingham students during the present school year, Gainsborough's famous portrait of "The Blue Boy" is being displayed at Barnum Junior high school.

The picture, with four other well-known masterpieces, is on display in the Barnum library this week.

All five pictures will go to Hill school the following week where they may be seen by the public as well as students from elementary schools. They will be used in connection with art classes at Barnum.

The University of Michigan extension service will supply reproductions representing the whole history of painting under a plan sponsored by the Birmingham PTA Council, Barnum PTA and other interested groups.

"PICTURES IN GROUPS of 5 to 10" will be shown here for two weeks, then returned to Ann Arbor to be replaced by others. They will be in Birmingham at intervals from September to June.

"We believe these reproductions of fine paintings will help students in their understanding of art," said Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, in commenting on the plan.

"It is to be hoped also that the community at large will avail itself of the opportunity to see the pictures while they are here."

The four pictures accompanying "The Blue Boy" are "Portrait of the Comtesse D'Haussonville," by Ingres; "The Water Mill," by Hobbema; "Houses at Honfleur," by Corot; and "Lake Anney," by Cezanne.

They may be seen the week of September 25 at Hill school.

If there is enough interest, evening viewing hours may be arranged for adult groups as the project develops. Other pictures scheduled for the showing will be announced as they arrive.
