

## Birmingham Council of Church Women Names "Ecumenical Register Month"

The Birmingham Council of Church Women has designated the month of October as Ecumenical Register month, it was announced by Mrs. John K. Ormond of N. Woodward avenue, president of the council.

Council members hope to reach all Protestant women in this area who have not yet had an opportunity to enroll in the Ecumenical Register of Church Women. The register is a nation-wide project to put a American Protestant woman on record for greater

Christian cooperation throughout the world.

"ECUMENICAL" was taken from a Greek word meaning "household," and in the churches refers to the entire household or family of Christianity.

The project of the register was launched as part of the council's preparation for its merger with seven other interdenominational agencies into the new National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

The registration in Birmingham will be carried on chiefly through the women's organizations of the various member churches.

Final results of this nation-wide registration will be announced at the National Assembly of the United Council of Church Women, co-ordinating agency for the state and local councils, in Cincinnati, O., November 12 through 16.

## Local U. of M. Alumni Join National Observance of "Atom Day" On Monday

"Atom Day" is Monday, Oct. 2. On that day some 120,000 University of Michigan alumni throughout the country will launch their program to make the atom work for humanity.

George H. Cary, chairman for the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills area, announced plans today for a rally at the home of Mrs. Marcus Cunningham on Brady Lane in Bloomfield Hills. This will take place simultaneously with scores of other meetings across the country.

The event, Cary said, "which will be linked by a transcontinental telephone hookup, is intended to build support for the expansion of a far reaching atomic research program being developed by the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor."

"There is a new urgency today in all aspects of atomic research and we are increasing our facilities accordingly. We are establishing a research center to coordinate atomic studies in all fields of knowledge."

"We believe the center will contribute importantly to the development of techniques to protect

humanity against the consequences of atomic attack; the application of new atomic knowledge to human welfare and the preparation for industrial changes of the atomic age."

Cary pointed out that the center has been created as a living memorial to the 579 men and women of the university who lost their lives during World War II.

ALUMNI AND OTHERS interested in the work will be given an opportunity, at next Monday's meeting, to gain an insight into the tremendous possibility of the activity, Cary stresses.

"Leading national figures," he said, "including Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, president of Columbia university, with Warren Austin and many others will be heard on the national hookup."

Mrs. Marcus Cunningham and Cary are co-chairmen of the local committee.
