Community Meeting

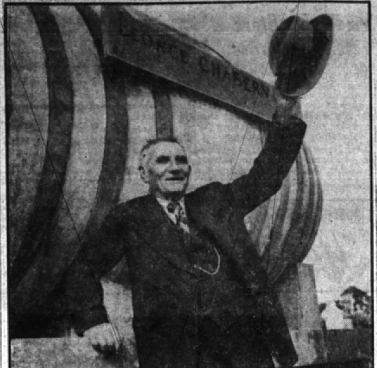
