Green Light Given to New Traffic Signal

CC Sees Busy Days Soon at Eton-Maple Intersection

With an eye towards future traffic increases, the city commission Monday night approved the installation of traffic signals at the Eton-Maple intersection.

A traffic survey by the Birmingham police department showed that "at the present time the traffic volume falls below the recommended minimum for a signal installation and the accidents have not been excessive."

It continues, "But the increased residential building in the north-east section of the city and several large commercial developments to the east are bound to increase traffic through this intersection."

The new Dearborn Motors plant will be constructed close to this location.

COMMISSIONERS approved an appropriation of \$1,200 for a wooden pole construction involving two two-way three lens signals overhead and two one-way auxiliary signals, to be installed above the pavement and at the side of the roadway to handle the increased traffic masses through the railway viaduct.

Chief of Police Ralph W. Moxley said the system of two-way signals left turns which will be suspended from the same cable as the main signal.

"It is felt there is not enough traffic to justify a location of a one-face green arrow to indicate left turns which will be suspended from the same cable as the main signal," he said.

William Potts, of the Automobile Club, has made a location study of the intersection and recommended a signal installation. He has presented a drawing showing the signal layout.

SINCE MAPLE is a county road, Leon Balknap, Oakland County road commissioner, has been contacted and had no objection to the proposed installation.

A. N. Laird, chief engineer of the Grand Trunk Western railroad, reported that he would be glad to cooperate. He suggested the city contact the division superintendent in charge of the line to construct and maintain this line under their tracks in view of the installation's approval.

Laird felt that the lines should be underground because "any overhead wires under the viaduct would be unsightly."

Paving of Crestview Draws Long Confab At Commission Meet

Property owners in Birmingham, Crestview subdivision spent an hour and 20 minutes in discussion with the city commission Tuesday night on the street improvement program for Maryland, Shipman, Northlawn and Southlawn.

The proposed street improvement called for a 25-foot paving at an estimated cost of \$90,000. This would include a concrete pavement and rolled curbs.

Residents suggested a 24-foot pavement, stating they felt this would eliminate some of the traffic hazards in the area, making it safer for their children.

Others said they favored asphalt paving as more desirable for a residential area than the concrete.

The city commission, after the long discussion, voted to prepare a tax roll based on the 25 foot concrete paving, stating that a final hearing on the project would be held within the next three or four weeks.
