out-state hospitals where such capital facilities, as operating rooms, X-rays, etc., already available for many more patients.

"\$24,000 annually for MCO and U of M too much for higher college education. Expand Junior College program. Many parents cannot send their children to these universities because of the cost. State subsidizing education of students from other states.

"Make Conservation Department self-supporting by charging license only \$1.00 annually for adults to use state parks (excepting children, Boy Scouts, etc.)

"Need a new yardstick for welfare applicants and careful investigation. Right to health for everybody. Accomplishments of science should be made available to all, but not through socialized medicine. Many supervisory positions could be eliminated in all state employment except prisons. There could be more intelligent use of present personnel. State has adequate funds for general purposes except roads.

"Should be changes in tax system. Eventual elimination of sales tax. Would substitute flat rate income tax for sales tax at least of two evils. Favors graduated income tax after constitutional amendment.

"Favor increase in gasoline and

weight tax on commercial carriers. Opposed to corporation net income tax because it drives business to lower labor market in other states and only passes tax on to consumer. If more money is needed, would increase inheritance tax.

"Should be reapportionment. Favor straight population in both houses based on voting population over ten-year average. Cities over 500,000 should be restricted.

"State should assist Wayne Medical School, where there is an abundance of clinical material. We need more doctors—not specialists. Liquor enforcement should be under the State Police head."

**THOMAS S. LEITH**, Brighton; 61, College graduate. Present mayor of Brighton, Chm. Livingston County Board of Supervisors. Business, real estate and builder. Former teacher at Adrian College, Detroit University School and President Michigan Military Academy.

"Secondary roads in poor condition because money has been diverted in wrong channels. If earmarking had been carried out, we would have successful road building. County treasurers should collect sales tax and Lansing Dept. of sales tax collection should be cut to 15 or 20. We could save 20 million dollars.

"Government supervised insur-

ance companies should run state service funds, but until federal government changes procedure of collection, state must continue along the same lines.

"Welfare cases could be cut. Every dept. Lansing could be cut 10%. Eliminate waste. Don't start new projects until we have funds. State has enough money at present if they don't try to expand.

"Business men and experts should review tax system and put it on a businesslike basis. Sales tax could be decreased by 1%. Opposed to corporation net income tax as corporations do not pay taxes—it is added to cost and taxes individuals. Oppose individual income tax. Oppose increase in gasoline and weight tax.

"According to constitution, reapportionment should be done through legislature. New census will bring about reapportionment. House should be based on straight population, not the Senate. Districting should be considered separately. Favor reapportionment by amendment if necessary.

"Too much money is being spent to obtain public offices."

**DAN MILLS**, Detroit; 44. Grad. in civil engineering. Machine-tool dealer, self-employed.

"Should improve mental hospitals; many of these institutions should not be there, such as aged persons. Many not in institutions should be in homes to care for or eliminate any service. In general, services being rendered economically."

"Except for Highway Dept., have adequate funds for administration. Don't favor any change in state tax system. Opposed to new taxes except gasoline and weight tax. Opposed to corporation income tax; consumer pays. Not collecting proper amount of sales tax because of poorly functioning State Sales Tax Commission.

Only fair way to administer highway program is by additional pay-as-you-go gasoline tax borne by the oil companies as Michigan has one of the lowest gas tax rates in the nation, yet pays among highest prices for retail gasoline.

"Reapportionment should be submitted to people in form of referendum. Favor straight area in both houses. No comment on districting of cities. No comment on enforcement of reapportionment."

**WILLIAM C. VANDENBERG**, Holland; 65. Business manager. Serving third term as State Senator. Former member Holland City Council, 5 years.

"No additional services needed and none need to be improved. Would not reduce or eliminate any services. Services could be rendered more economically by reducing personnel. State has sufficient funds, but they are not equitably distributed.

"Believe entire tax structure would not reduce or eliminate or decrease sales tax at this time. Do not favor corporation net income tax as corporations do not pay taxes—only collect them. Not in favor of decreasing gasoline and weight taxes.

"Have no definite solution of problem of reapportionment. Did not care to comment on any of the reapportionment questions."

**JOHN J. BROWN**, Hazel Park; 55. Attended Trinity College, London, Perry (Indiana) two years. Self-employed. Real estate broker. Says, "No promises made to any group."

"I am for peace... world's peace. That is a difficult problem and would require a lot of study. You would have to consider many things and the problem could not be solved overnight. I am for peace for all the people in the world."

"Believe reduction in Federal bureaucracy would result in sounder government.

"Favor St. Lawrence Waterway. Should be an adequate Federal old age pension. Would not want to mention any other legislation because things are happening too fast to be able to tell what's ahead."

**HUGH K. DAVIDSON**, Detroit; 47. Graduate Detroit College. Law. Self-employed as attorney. Member Michigan State Bar Ass'n, Detroit Bar Ass'n, American Bar Ass'n, Attorney for State Bar Ass'n, Grievance Committee, Judiciary Committee of Detroit Bar Ass'n, Legislative Committee of Governor's Study Commission on Sex Deviants.

"Exhibition of strength necessary so we do not lose manpower and materials piecemeal and extensively. American forces cannot defend Alaska without maintaining a base in Korea. Believe in immediate full mobilization.

"Any answer on fiscal policy not made in the light of or based upon statistics covering supply and demand would be futile."

"Primarily interested in legislation involving constitutional law. Feel government should pay the

U. S. Government to either deposit coal for a long time or to advocate forceful overthrow of the U. S. Government. So-called "communistic followers" should not in any way be persecuted, for to do so would be to take the first step toward a police state and untold injuries contrary to the protections guaranteed by U. S. Constitution.

**GEORGE A. DONDERO**, Royal Oak; 66. Lawyer. Detroit College of Law, L.L.B. Offices held in Royal Oak; clerk, treasurer, assessor, attorney many, member board of education. Oakland County; Ass't. Prosecuting Attorney, U. S. Representative, 1933 to date. (A member to questions as of July 7, 1950.)

"The firm stand taken in Korea important step in securing peace. Until Russia knows we are going to stand firmly for our principles, there will be no peace. Certainly with a nation like Russia on the move, there is no other position to take except a firm and determined stand."

"Reduce public spending—reduce taxes as much as possible so business and people generally may be encouraged. Should have more of their earnings than we are."

"Even in the last tax bill, where excise taxes were reduced and corporation taxes increased, not enough was accomplished. Favor reducing of excise taxes—voted for the legislation.

"Having seen first-hand in Europe what socialistic government does to people, opposed to all legislation leading to further socialization. Bitterly opposed to socialized medicine. Opposed to entrenching federal government any further in socialized patterns, doing services that should be done locally."

"We cannot continually be giving Federal aid and at the same time be cutting down Federal aid save with our right hand and spend with the left at the same time. We must stop the practice of undermining activities of "red" aliens."

"Favor preserving peace at all costs, even to the sacrifice of more lives. Due to limited sources of information, unwilling to commit self further. If elected, my views might change in the light of new facts."

"Believe we should stop sending so much money abroad for other nations and other people. Feel our wealth is limited so should reduce expenditures at home and abroad.

"Would promote St. Lawrence waterway. Favor flood control in Clinton River area to prevent flooding of basements and homes. I would be devoted to the preservation and protection of the interests of the United States in education from high and low places in Washington or elsewhere anyone tainted with the stench of Communism in undermining our way of life or institutions."

Former Federal employee, civil service, U.S. Gov't Department of Army Supervision; owned and operated plastics and advertising business; toolmaker; own and operate farming business in Crosswicks, Mich.; Member Hazel Park Taxpayers Ass'n.

"Strengthen United Nations. Help preserve democracy and prevent aggression by making each nation secure economically and militarily. 'Go the limit' in helping friendly nations. Promote agricultural and non-conflicting industrial and education programs. International trade is important opening access to world; natural resources."

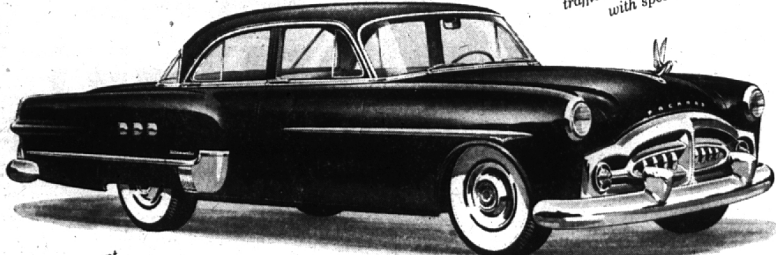
