In spite of this increase in volume, our expenses were reduced from \$28,063.32 to \$23,327.81, a saving of over \$4,700 in actual money."

"Because of increased volume, actual saving amounts to estimated \$10,000 reduction in overall costs."

"Oakland County records its papers for the least cost of any county in state and thereby returns much larger profit over and above expenses. It is planned to continue the project of microfilming old records as a further economy move and to extend the improvement of the tract index system."
