**Proposals Studied By LWV Members**

The proposed recreation program for Birmingham was studied by three discussion meetings of the League of Women Voters last week.

Members included national and state findings in their study of the local program, stating they were convinced preventive services for children were far superior to remedial ones. They also felt adequate recreational facilities were among the best deterrents of juvenile delinquency.

Members endorsed the capital improvement program which the city recreation board submitted to city commissioners last month but expressed some difference of opinion as to the best method of financing the program.

**PARTIAL APPROVAL** was given the sale of city-owned lots with the feeling that some tax monies should be allocated to the recreation board yearly, outside from the operational budget.

Members approved construction of play areas in the northeast section where none exist now.

They also agreed that large tennis courts and a swimming pool might be financed through a bond issue. Possible donations as a possible source of income were also mentioned.

**Salary Hike Given To Southfield Twp. Water Employees**

A salary increase for members of the Southfield township water department was approved by the township board Tuesday evening.

The water department is a self-sustaining enterprise and the increase was requested by Superintendent Leonard Lamb. He stated the department had a \$16,200 profit last year.

Supervisor William Rosser also announced that a fire hall site has been purchased on 13 Mile road about a quarter mile west of Southfield.

At the annual township meeting Monday evening, a \$211,641 budget was approved.
