Negro Educator Describes Work At Piney Woods

How a school grew from the simple set of a man sitting under a tree and reading a book, to a 1,700 acre, \$250,000 institution is the story Birmingham Retirees heard Monday from Dr. Lawrence Clifton Jones, Ph.D., founder of the Piney Woods school for Negroes in Mississippi.

He told of the eagerness these young Negroes have displayed and the hardships they have endured in seeking further education and a place of some of their accomplishments.

Dr. Jones, a graduate of the State University of Iowa, is widely known in educational fields and as a speaker and writer. He was introduced by John Hosen of Ann Arbor, one of the school trustees.


