Among the 406 recipients from 70 Michigan counties are Marilyn L. Hart and Marilyn L. Begg of Birmingham high school and Dolores L. Serafini of Troy high school. Grants are awarded on the basis of honor scholastic average, financial need and good extracurricular activities in high school. Scholarships cover total course fees at the college for one year, although they may be renewed for a total of four years if the student maintains a high scholastic average.
