Artist Heard at Jubilee Concert

Miss Long is an attractive young woman completely at ease on the stage. She is a natural comedienne with a fine lyric voice which she uses with skill. Coloring her tones to fit each mood, she excels in the story telling of the lighter, humorous songs.

Her program was a decided departure from the usual arrangement beginning with songs usually sung for encores. The wistful Irish folk songs, "I know where 'I'm goin'" was the first and gave real promise of what was to follow.

The second group of spirituals was sincerely presented but the first again was the best, so simply and beautifully sung, "I Stood on de Ribber oh Jordan". It is a great temptation to most singers to make these simple religious outpourings of faith too ornate, sometimes even jazzy.

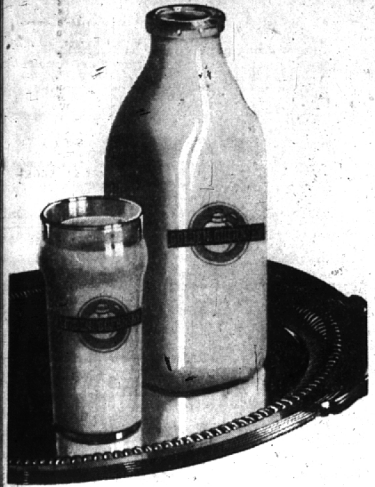
The third group was devoted to Lieder. The Marx "Hat Dich d'ie Liebe berührt" was beautifully sung followed by an indifferent performance of Brahms' Lullaby and Schumann's Widmung.

Why do recitalists feel they must sing an aria and why of all arias "Pace Pace"? Let us have operatic arias where they belong—in the opera house.

In the next two groups of songs, Miss Long really grew in warmth and tone. The French was enchanting, especially the Poulenc and the lovely flowing Chanson Triste. She also sang several new songs which no one has sung before. There was a stunning performance of the old German hymn Exaltation. Last and by no means least, the Gershwin "My Man's Gone Now", from "Porgy and Bess". A most talented and humorous person is Miss Carolyn Long.

She was very fortunate in having Joseph Seiger as her accompanist. Sensitive and sure he was with her all the way. He also played a solo group which delighted everyone.
