

**Red Cross Completes Emergency Housing Survey in Township**

SCOTTSFIELD—The 58 buildings selected throughout the 38 square miles of Scottsfield township for emergency housing and feeding stations in the event of disaster, have been found suitable. Their use by the civil defense agencies has been authorized by the owners or custodians.

The survey was conducted by the American Red Cross for the state director of civil defense. Schools, churches, clubs, inns and ball fields enough to accommodate 50 or more persons were included, based on usable square footage, utilities, cooking and sanitary facilities.
