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Opposes Park St. Extension

The city's traffic consultants, Gunderson & Dobelek, have recommended that plans for extending Park street from Hamilton to Maple be abandoned.

Traffic engineers of the American Automobile association are also in essential agreement with Gunderson and Dobelek's recommendation, according to City Manager Donald C. Egbert.

AN INFORMAL HEARING has been set for Monday evening, Aug. 20, so that property owners involved can state their opinions as to whether the proposed project should be forgotten.

The city has already purchased the property needed for the extension at a cost of \$16,000.

In a letter to the city manager, Oscar Gunderson, traffic engineer, stated that the few benefits the extension would bring would be insufficient to justify completion of the project.

Disadvantages apart from the cost of the project were outlined in the letter. Gunderson stated, "In order to minimize traffic interference at N. 16th, it would be necessary to operate the street one-way northbound and probably prohibit left turns by eastbound Maple, as well as the straight through movement by northbound Hamilton."

HE ADDED, "The location is so close to Hunter that it would be highly objectionable to permit any but right turns off Maple into the new street. Three new conflict points all of which would offer additional hazard would be created at the south side of Hamilton, the alley, and the north side of Maple."

The traffic consultant concluded, "Since there is little demand for the street at present, and it cannot be demonstrated that there will be an important future demand; and in view of cost, traffic interference and only minor benefit, it is recommended that the project be abandoned."

House Moving Ord. Approved In Southfield

Two new township zoning ordinance changes were approved by the Southfield township board Tuesday evening, and three others sent back to the zoning board for revision.

One new provision restricts moving of homes into the township by the township and set up... as residences. This shall not apply to auto trailer houses located in established trailer parks and camps.

Other ordinance amendment was to change zoning in the north one-half of section eight and west of Telegraph and all of the north one-half of section seven from residential two to four classification.

The zoning board also asked the township board to pass on rezoning of property in Franklin from 12 1/2 mile road to 14 mile and Indolter to Telegraph. Amendment originally provided for all homes to be changed to residence five classification. This "would mean that homes being built would have to be at least 20,000 cubic feet.

TOWNSHIP BOARD members felt that the present residence two classification should be kept along with residence five so it passed its recommendation back to the zoning board.

Also sent back with a further recommendation was an amendment to rezone property bounded by 13 1/2 mile, Lahner, 12 mile and Telegraph from residence two to residence three classification.

REPRESENTATIVES of Brook Road Hills subdivision appeared and requested if something could be done about improving drainage conditions on Brook road.

It was stated that unhealthy conditions are caused by the water standing in the roadway. Residents also pointed out that the road was impassible in the spring time because of drainage conditions.

Reduction Irks Troy Residents

A delegation of property owners from the 17-18 mile road area appeared at Monday evening's Troy township board meeting and protested the use of water by White Chapel cemetery for sprinkling purposes.

They claimed that many persons were forced to haul their own water because of the reduction in water pressure.

Supervisor Norman R. Barnard stated that because the board did not expect to take up this matter at Monday's meeting, no representative from White Chapel was present.

Barnard said he and Clifton Truesdell, township clerk, will confer with White Chapel officials this week.

In other business, the board approved a resolution requesting the county drain commission to clean out drains in the southeast section of the county.

THE BOARD ALSO approved a general resolution favoring a drain survey in the southeast section of the county. Troy's share of the expense will be \$257.

The township zoning board's recommendation that the Jim Robbins Co. property on Stephenson highway, north of 14 mile road, be rezoned from agricultural to industrial use was approved by the board Monday.

It is planned to construct a plastic plant at this site, Barnard stated.

Residents Hint At Court Action

A suit in circuit court to force city commissioners to follow residents' wishes regarding traffic control was hinted at Monday night by Charles K. Barton, 1694 S. Eton.

Eton residents have petitioned the commission for several stop signs and lower than 25 mph speed limit as a means of halting speeding cars and trucks.

Court Order Being Compiled Within Troy Township

Troy Township Supervisor Norman R. Barnard said this week that the two-story cinder block structure at 2034 John K. road, which has been used as an apartment house, is now undergoing remodeling.

Circuit Court Judge Frank Doty recently upheld the township's request for a restraining order.

Township authorities said the structure's owner failed to comply with the building code. Judge Doty ordered that at least 23 persons should move from the building.

Previously 40 lived there in conditions which were described as unsightly.

Barnard stated that Building Inspector Henry Herring visited the structure last week and found 23 persons still living there. However, eight have made definite plans to move shortly.

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
