### Paving of Haynes Not Slated for '51 Program

Haynes street residents Monday night asked city commissioners what had become of their petition for paving from Columbia to Eton.

City Manager Donald Egbert told a representative that the work could not be done this season and would be considered as soon as the current program is ended. After study by the engineering department, a final decision will be made during the winter.

### Sidewalk Improvement Hearing Is Tabled

Because of the absence of three members from Monday's city commission meeting, a hearing to consider any objections to construction of sidewalk on Columbia was tabled until Aug. 27.

Commission proposes to create a special assessment district to defray cost of the construction of the sidewalk on the east side of Columbia from Haynes to a point 145 feet south; and from Villa, 125 feet south.

### Deficiency Roll Due

A deficiency roll of \$2,900 for the paving of Cole, from Adams to Torry, will come before next week's city commission meeting.

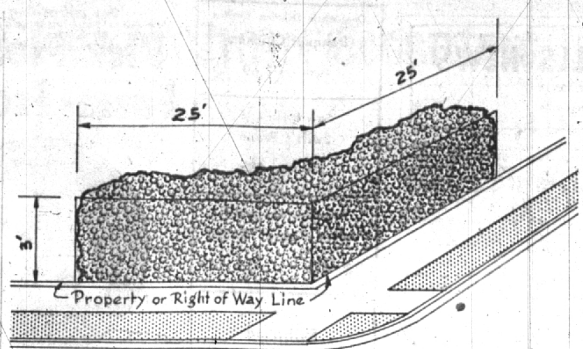

### Zoning Board Member Resigns

Wylie Groves this week resigned as a member of the Birmingham zoning board of appeals after 14 years of service. He became a member of the board under the zoning ordinance adopted in 1937.

Groves stated that since he has recently become a member of the city commission, he did not feel compatible to retain membership on the zoning board of appeals concurrently with membership in the city commission.

City commissioners accepted his resignation and thanked Groves for his long service. His successor will be named in about two weeks.

### Transfer Funds to Pay City's Share of Current Street Improvement Work

Funds totalling \$36,722.69 have been transferred from the \$50,000 budget item for the city's share of special assessment districts into the SAI account. These monies have been allocated to six districts for work being done during the \$1951-52 program.

Gutters and gravel for Edgewood took \$1,002.85 from the fund; asphaltic concrete in Edgewood, \$2,021.20; paving Smith, Bird and Edgewood, \$5,174.37; Pembroke Manor improvement, \$25,000.07; Baldwin court, temporary surfacing, \$61.00; and Wood Maple sewer, Chester to Southfield, \$20.25.
