the aggressiveness and cooperation of practically every member of the present city commission during my short term as Mayor.
"In every way you have accepted the challenge of the tremendous problems which we had and cut through red tape wherever possible to expedite street improvements, additional recreational facilities and other items too numerous to mention.

"IT HAS BEEN a pleasure to be associated with commission members who have realized that their job was more than a Monday night proposition and who have given every evidence of having made as complete an investigation as possible of all information available concerning the subjects on the agenda upon which they would have to vote.

"In leaving I would like to state that I feel I have gained more personally than has Birmingham from my having served the city. Today I have a better appreciation of the many problems confronting the city and a deeper devotion to Birmingham and its interests.

"I also want to express my thanks to the un-numbered citizens who have given freely of their time and counsel to make my stay in public office so pleasant."

Ritchie was elected to the commission in April, 1950 and was named Mayor this April.

He has been active in boy scout work and was program chairman of the Quarten club scouts for several years. He also is a charter member of the Birmingham chamber of commerce.

Drilling in Progress For Beverly Hills Subd. Test Well

Drilling for the six-inch test well in Beverly Hills subdivision reached 200 feet this week. Leary Oberlin Co. is doing the work on the site which is at the rear of Accacia Park cemetery.

If the test well proves successful, a permanent 12-inch well will be installed. Authorization for this work was made several weeks ago by the Southfield township board, so that Beverly Hills residents would have some relief for the present water situation there.

Little League Records Announced

Complete records for this season's Birmingham Little League baseball organization were released this week by statistician John Adamson.

Hitting champion is Dick Sneed, Indian shortstop, who batted .512 on 31 hits in 41 appearances. Close behind is Bill Appel of the Yanks with .509 (27-53).

OTHER BATTING LEADERS were Bill Deer, Red Sox, .463 (28-54); Doug Waggner, Red Sox, .452 (14-31); and Jerry Millson, Tigers, .447 (21-47).

Appel led in hits with 27, followed by Deer who collected 25. Other department leaders were runs batted in, Ed Leavenworth, Indians, 21; triples, Leavenworth, four; doubles, Deer, eight; home runs, Roger Hard, Indians, two; speed, Sneed, 25; and stolen bases, Bob Squires, Tigers, five.

Terry O'Connor, Red Sox left-handed pitcher, had an outstanding record. His earned run average was 0.8 and he won six and lost two. In addition, he hurled 48 innings, allowed 23 hits, and six

earned runs and struck out 84. An undefeated pitching record was noted by Doug Waggner, Red Sox, who won four and lost none. In 237 innings, he allowed nine earned runs, 13 hits and struck out 39. After being injured at mid-season, he didn't play again.

ALTHOUGH POSTING a losing record, Larry Howey, of the Indians, had an earned run average of but two runs. He won four and lost five, hurled 50.3 innings, allowed 17 earned runs, 38 hits and struck out 81.

Other top winning averages were made by Bob Vincent, of the Yanks, with five wins and two defeats, and Jim Ellis, of the Tigers, with four victories and one loss.

Team standings for the first half-season of play were Red Sox, eight wins, one defeat; Yanks, five wins, four losses; Indians, four wins, five losses; and Tigers, one victory, eight defeats.

In the second half, final standings were Indians, six wins, three losses; Yanks, five victories, four defeats; Tigers, four wins and five

losses; and Red Sox, three wins and six setbacks.
Indians and Red Sox are meeting in the playoffs this week for the season championship and possession of the Tom Bosquette Memorial trophy.
