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Commission Tables Bloomfield 4H Club Members Win Ribbons at Co. Fair

Long discussed extension of Park street from Hamilton to Maple was tabled indefinitely by the city commission Monday evening.

In a letter to commissioners last week, the city's traffic consultants, Gauderson & Dubeliet, recommended that proposed plans be abandoned.

Some of the property needed for the project has already been purchased by the city at a cost of \$16,000. It was pointed out that the sites still will be valuable to hold.

TRAFFIC ENGINEERS felt that the extension would create a traffic hazard on E. Maple. Louis Hasall appeared at the meeting and stated he was opposed to the extension of Park street. However he suggested that Hamilton could be extended across Hunter boulevard. Permission of state highway department is necessary for this action.

Commissioners agreed to present this matter for the recommendations of the city's traffic consultants.

Manday's discussion on the Park street extension was part of an informal public hearing, called for the purpose of discussing the situation with property owners. No person appeared to defend the extension.
