Award Contract For Construction Of Curb-Gutter

Contract for construction of curb and gutter on Henrietta and Edensborough was awarded Monday evening by the city commission to Tony Angelo Cement Construction Co.

The firm originally bid in the amount of \$12,000.50 for curb-gutter drainage structures, curb and gutter construction and excavation. However it agreed to delete the excavation and structures

and only build the curb and gutter at a unit price of \$2.45 per foot. Cost will be \$5,771.50.

A PURCHASE ORDER will be issued to William Glader for excavation, structures and sewer on Henrietta and excavation on Edensborough.

Construction will be on Henrietta from Northlawn to Lincoln and Edensborough from Maple to Dorchester.

City Engineer L. R. Gare's recommendation for two-thirds of the 1951 sidewalk construction contract also was approved by the commission.

He stated that it will take care of the area bounded by Holland, Eaton, 14 Mile road and South

Woodward. Included is approximately 200 square feet of sidewalk on Cole street in front of lots 270-275 which are owned by the school board.

Also in the contract are sewer lots on Washington boulevard; 12 lots in Birmingham Crestview subdivision; and several isolated locations throughout the city.

A total of 20,163 square feet of sidewalk construction was approved this week. This year's program calls for 50,000 square feet.

Responsibility for construction approved this week is as follows: city sewer, 2,772 sq. ft.; city area, 1,136; city intersection, 642; curb and gutter contract, 1,232; Consumers Power, 621; and owners, 13,801.

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Watch How You Turn, Police Warn

One out of eight Birmingham traffic accidents is caused by improper turns and these turns are costing the Birmingham Motorist over \$9,000 a year, the accident records of the police department reveal.

According to Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley, last year, improper turns were indicated in 39 accidents, causing an estimated loss of \$9,126. "Improper turn violations are again one of the leading causes of traffic accidents and have been present in 23 collisions during the first eight months this year," Moxley said.

"Property loss from this cause in 1951 has been \$9,072 and this averages \$264 for each accident," Moxley stated, "and these figures do not take into account the persons injured, the suffering they must endure or the costs of doctors bills and hospital."

Moxley said all officers have been advised to be alert for the violations that are present in the improper turning movement and these violations are: no signal, cut corner, turn into wrong lane, and turn from wrong lane.

"The latter violation is the most serious of these listed and has been a heavy contributor to the accident toll," Moxley declared.

Moxley said that several intersections have given considerable trouble with improper turns with Woodward and Lincoln potentially the most dangerous.

"When a motorist leaves the business district and goes south on Woodward and tries to cross four lanes to Hunter boulevard, he is courting disaster. It is recommended that this turn be made at Hazel or Haynes," Moxley added.

Moxley added that another dangerous practice followed by many motorists is making a left turn from the curb at the Maples intersection.

"All of these illegal moves are hazardous and must be discontinued if our accident toll is to be reduced and the Police department solicits the motorist's cooperation in this effort even though it may mean they will have to drive a little further," Moxley stressed.

"It is hoped this cooperation will require a minimum of Police action to correct the condition as it now exists," Moxley concluded.

Real Estate Board Asks State, National Bodies To Establish Boundaries

Jerome Benjamin, president of the Birmingham Real Estate board said this week the local board has petitioned state and national boards to definitely define boundary lines for the Birmingham area.

"We have asked," he said, "that they set as boundaries the Birmingham and Bloomfield school districts, mining that area which lies north of Square Lake road."

Benjamin explained that to have definite boundaries set which could be designated as the Birmingham board's area would permit greater control of buying and selling real estate and stop the possibility of undesirable sales being made.

Municipal Pool Committee To Condense Material Prior To Report

A condensed report, which will still cover about 40 pages, of the material obtained by the swimming pool committee will be prepared as soon as possible, according to City Commissioner Frank Rising, chairman.

Rising said a mass of material had been gathered from all sections of the country on such a project and would be compiled for a clear understanding before being released by the group.

He told commissioners his group was well aware of the problems concerning the proposed pool for the new high school and government restrictions which control construction of pools at this time.
