## Dearborn Motors Grant Backs Research on Soil

A fundamental research program into the mysteries of trace elements in the soil, which may lead to increased yields and greater nutritional value in farm crops, is underway by Dearborn Motors corporation and the University of Michigan.

Announcement of the project, known as "Operation Tracer," was made Tuesday by Thomas A. Farrell, president of Dearborn Motors, and Dr. Alexander G. Rutheven, president of the university.

Dearborn Motors has made a grant of \$100,000 to establish and finance the research for the first four years as a part of the Michigan Memorial Phoenix project. Results of the research will be made available to the public, Farrell said.

COMMENTING ON the program, Rutheven said: "The teamwork between an important industrial concern and a university research staff which is contemplated by the project is exactly the kind of mutually beneficial

much, and in what form they should be applied to make corn, potatoes, wheat, trees, etc., grow faster and better. Although only small amounts of these nutrients are needed by plants, spectacular increases in yields have been obtained when they were added to deficient soils. Iron sulfate sprayed on soy beans in Iowa doubled the yield. Without zinc sulfate, sweet corn cannot be grown on some much soils in Michigan. But with the application of 100 pounds per acre, yields of more than 8 tons per acre are possible.

Headquarters for "Operation Tracer" are now located in the School of Natural Resources and Arbor. Some phases of the work will be carried out in other sections of the state. Considerable new equipment, including electronic machines, will be constructed or purchased. An important part of the research will involve radio-active materials.

Scientists know that the presence or absence of trace elements—iron, boron, copper, zinc, molybdenum—is of tremendous importance to the growth of virtually everything humans eat. Beyond that, little is known definitely.

"OPERATION TRACER" will attempt to discover how plants assimilate trace elements and determine which elements, how
