For the past few weeks many Birmingham parents have been poring over the "Letters to Santa Claus," written by their children and printed elsewhere in these pages.

But Santa Claus will come in person to the homeless and dependent children of the Sarah Fisher Home on West 12 Mile Road, on Sunday afternoon, December 16. And Santa will turn over the requests he receives to his very special agents in this

area, the women of the Seton Guild.

Santa will be the guest of honor at the Christmas party and Open House given by the 350 members of the Seton Guild of the St. Vincent's and Sarah Fisher Home. Included in the membership are 135 localites.

Sharing the spotlight with the venerable old gentleman will be the boys and girls of the Home, along with adult guests and their children. All will receive favors

and candies, while Santa is taking requests for that "special" gift for Christmas morning. Guild members are determined that Santa will grant every wish, for they feel that these children must have their faith kept firm for the future.

THE CHRISTMAS party will also honor another event—the centennial celebration of the Sisters of Charity in the child care field in this area. 1951 marks one hundred years of service spent in caring for 15,000 homeless and dependent children of every race and creed.

A modern cottage plan institution, The Sarah Fisher Children's Home was built in 1928, as a gift to the Daughters of Charity by Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Fisher, Sr.

Dedicated to the care of children in need, from infancy to adolescence, its history goes back to 1861, when the original St. Vincent Home was established in Detroit.

Today all the children enjoy homelike rooms, the spacious playground, and rolling countryside.

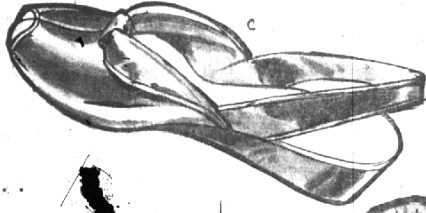
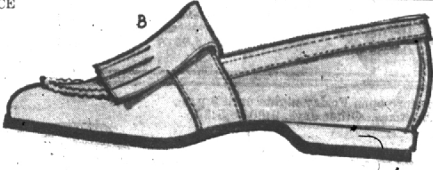
Social Briefs

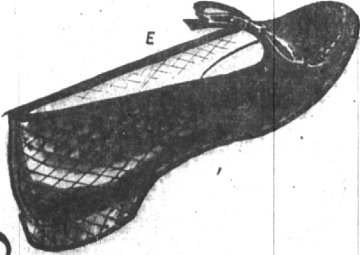
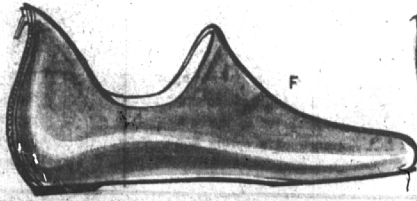
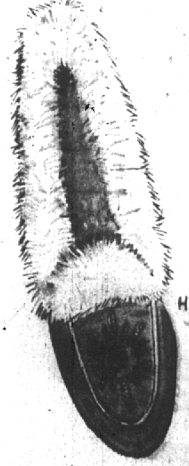
