Annual Dance For Juniors Friday Night

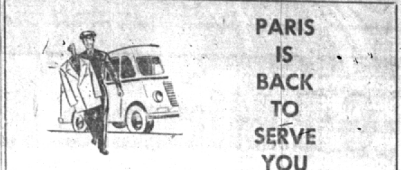
After reading the "Collegian" column, one might gather that Birmingham is to be taken over by homescoming college students for the next few weeks.
