Continue Garbage, Rubbish Discussions

Further discussion by the city commission concerning the Southeastern Oakland Garbage and Rubbish authority was held over until the Wednesday, Dec. 26 meeting.

Monday evening City Manager Donald C. Egbert presented his report on a recent tour by authority officials to incinerators in the Cleveland, Ohio, area.

Egbert also presented a resolution which would authorize an advance from the city of Birmingham of \$1,733.50 to pay for initial expenses in connection with the design of the new incinerator and acquisition of a site.

BECAUSE ONLY FOUR commissioners were present at Monday's meeting, it was decided to continue discussions of these matters till next week.

All municipalities in the garbage and rubbish authority have been asked to make an advance contribution at the rate of 50 cents per capita. Birmingham's figure is based on the official census figure of 15,467.

Egbert's report concerned his visit with other authority officials to Cleveland Dec. 4 and 5.

The city manager stated, "The primary purpose of the trip was to assure the members of the board that rubbish and garbage could be disposed of by incineration without the creation of a nuisance to surrounding areas."

"The incinerator at East Cleveland is located in an industrial area. However, the incinerator in Cleveland Heights is immediately adjacent to and of the same site with the city hall."

HE POINTED OUT that a great deal of information has been secured regarding incinerator operation in various cities in the United States and Canada. Egbert stated that it was found that a properly designed and operated incinerator doesn't constitute a nuisance to surrounding properties.

Engineering firm of Greeley and Hansen of Chicago has been retained to design the plant, which will be of the crane and bin type, mechanically stocked and provided with expansion chambers of sufficient capacity to eliminate any possible nuisance.

The city manager said, "It has been determined that the plant will be designed for a capacity of 400 tons daily. Plans and specifications will contemplate a building designed for a plant of this capacity; however alternatives will be provided to permit proposals being received for the elimination of one furnace which can be installed at a later date."
