Upon learning that there is agitation for another circuit court judge in Oakland County, an old-time Birmingham resident said, "With all these civil cases going on over in Southfield township, there should be a judge just for that area, too."

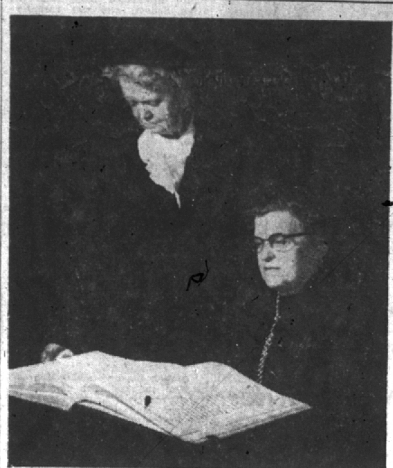

USS Toledo Back In 'States'; Troy Resident in Crew

GREAT LAKES, Ill.: After a year of combat operations in Korean waters, the heavy cruiser USS Toledo has returned to this country. Aboard the Toledo when she arrived at a West Coast port Dec. 7 was Raymond J. Johnson, fire controlman, first class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Slizewski, 1340 Lamb road, Troy township.

During an eight-month period, the Toledo's guns blasted communist targets from Inchon on the west coast to Chongjin high on the east coast, completing 410 separate fire missions.

During her 12 months in Korean waters, the ship participated in nearly 700 missions expending 15,000 rounds of high explosives, and added three battle stars to her Korean service ribbon.
