Dorothy Gaymer was the winner of an honorable mention award in upholstery.

OTHER EXHIBITS include a terra cotta head of St. Anthony by Joseph Balone, who has been a steady award winner in recent years. Recently he won a special citation in the 16th Ceramic National Exhibition at Syracuse, N.Y., and last year was awarded a first prize in the Cleveland show.

Paul Wright, another sculptor, recently completed a commission for the Terry Elementary School, depicting one of the Aesop fables.

PAINTER Paul Gedeon has a one-man show in progress at the Arena Theatre in Rochester, N.Y. His Christmas cards are rich designs in gold, black and brown, and his work is hand-done, others are linoleum cuts, and monotypes.
