Completes Boot Camp Training

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C.—Marine PFC John Blunt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira R. Blunt, 2397 1/2 Thirteenth Mile road, Southfield township, was promoted to his present rank when he graduated from boot camp Oct. 30.

Blunt climaxed his recruit training by winning the expert medal on the rifle range when he fired a score of 220 out of a possible 260 during weapons training. He entered the Marine Corps Aug. 22 and is a graduate of Ohio State University.

In addition to firing the Garand rifle for qualification, Blunt fired the .45 caliber rifle, such as other infantry weapons such as the Browning automatic rifle, carbine and the machine gun, mortar and flame thrower.
