Graduates Instructed to Read Biographies

The Rev. Edgar DeWitt Jones, minister emeritus of Woodward Christian church in Detroit, told 20 Birmingham high school graduates Thursday night that books could be among the great teachers of their future lives.

Referring to Abraham Lincoln as an example of a man with a love of books, he pointed out that even books not considered outstanding could contribute greatly to their lives. These books, even though mediocre, can do portray accurately the lives and works of men who were great.

"I would suggest to you that you start building a library about great people rather than one of only great writers. There are many great writers who are worth reading but do not think that a famous name is the only key to a book which can enrich your life.

"Look to great lives for education. Believe me, you can find them in books which are not even well-written. Weems' story of George Washington is one of these.

"LINCOLN READ the book repeatedly," we are told. Weems wasn't a good writer and didn't write a good book. He did, however, draw a word picture of Washington—the man, his greatness.
