**Candidates File for Nomination in Three Surrounding Townships**

Deadlines for filing nominating petitions for office, and registering for the Feb. 16 township primaries were Tuesday, Jan. 30. Large registrations were reported in Southfield, Troy and West Bloomfield townships.

The biggest registration of any previous township election in Southfield township has been reported by Mrs. Fannie Adams, township clerk.

Republican candidates for nomination for supervisor are incumbent Dudley P. Egan and William Roeder. Opposed on the GOP ticket for treasurer and clerk are incumbents Miss Clara Lane and Mrs. Fannie Adams.

**PRESENT JUSTICES** seeking reelection on the Republican ticket are Urban U. Woodhouse and Arthur L. Jayne. New candidates for justices are Republicans Mrs. Margaret Bradbury and James Campbell.

Seeking the Republican nomination for the board of review position are Fred Niedermiller, incumbent and Myron Greenfield.

On the Southfield Democratic ticket are supervisor, H. A. Murphy; treasurer, Mrs. Lucille M. Hunt; clerk, Mrs. Lillian Wald; justices, James I. Lampl and Mrs. Lena Ponsetti; board of review, Elmer Conski.

**IN TROY TOWNSHIP**, the Democratic ticket is headed by incumbent Charles R. Ryan who is opposed for the nomination. Others on the Democratic slate are clerk, Garland Aebel; treasurer, incumbent Mrs. Alice E. James; and justices, Donald J. Flynn and Malcolm Garbock.

Seeking Democratic nomination for constable are Ray E. Pace, Jr., Clinton B. Mullin, Elde Smith, Bert Griffin and Thomas H. Fischer. Board of review candidates for the Democratic nomination is Alexander Gow; and highway commissioner candidate, James E. Lane.

On the Republican ticket for Troy supervisor nomination are Township Clerk Norman R. Barnard and Marvin Kuschinsky. Seeking the bid for clerk are Duane Winter, Francis J. O'Neill, Jr. and Clifton Truesdell. Other candidates on the GOP ledger are treasurer, Fred W. Hildebrandt and Henry Eseman.

Ward DeConick will be unopposed for the nomination for the four year term to the board of review. Running for constable are Bert W. Hallett, Edwin Hiverson and Glenn R. Munger.

Library board candidates for the two year term are Marguerite Sisuz, Clifton E. Marvin and Mrs. Jane Clark (two to be elected).

**Maples Defeat East Detroit as Wall Sets Record**

With lanky forward and center Barry Wall sparking an aggressive offense in racking up 35 points for a new all-time single game scoring record, Birmingham coasted to an easy 72-42 victory in a league encounter with East Detroit here Friday.

Wall's phenomenal scoring effort eclipses the former all-time Detroit record established in 1939, when John McDonald scored 32 points in leading the Maples to a 75-21 victory over Rochester.

In spite of a bad back and wrenched ankle, Wall dropped in 15 field goals and five free throws in setting the new record.

In racking up the easy win over Detroit, the Maples came within three points of tying the all-time team scoring record. The old record of 75 points was set in the same game as the old individual mark.

**Grier, 54, Former GM Manager, Dies**

Services were held for James E. Grier, 215 Fairfax, former zone manager of the Pontiac division, General Motors, from the Bell funeral home Wednesday morning. Cremation and burial was in White Chapel cemetery.
