Bloomfield Hills Police and Fire Report Submitted

Bloomfield Hills police handled a total of 761 cases during 1950 and the fire department answered 65 calls, according to the annual police and fire reports.

A total of 437 cases were handled out of court and 105 in court. There were 129 reckless driving cases; 24 drunk and disorderly; 16 driving under the influence of liquor; and six miscellaneous cases.

In addition, the police department attended 96 traffic accidents. Policemen answered 143 animal calls, 401 miscellaneous calls, attended five fires and answered 20 state cases.

Hills police also made 14 calls to assist other departments, answered 14 prowler calls and had 17 breaking and entering cases reported.

There were two fatal accidents, one drowning, two reported illegal entries, six larceny reports, six mental cases, two abandoned cars and seven juvenile cases.

Bloomfield Hills police arrested a total of 98,630 miles during 1950, according to the re-

port submitted by Police Chief J. C. Banks.

INCLUDED IN THE 65 calls handled by the fire department, were seven automobile fires, five building fires, 28 grass fires, 10 miscellaneous calls, two motor susceptor calls.

The department had two practice runs, one call when wires were down, four investigations of smoke in the house and four investigations of gas leaks.

Fire trucks in the Hills traveled a total of 132.8 miles and used 3,405 gallons of water.

In addition, the firemen issued building permits and made several house inspections.
