Athletic Board Controls Local School Sports

A unique group controls the policies and functions of local school athletics. Last November a revised constitution and by-laws of the Birmingham Board of Interscholastic Athletics was set up, according to Frank Whitney, athletic director.

The purpose of the board is to formulate the policies for the interscholastic athletic program provide necessary equipment for the sports program; make athletic awards; and conduct all other business pertaining to interscholastic athletics.

MEMBERSHIP OF the board is composed of coaches of senior high sports, principals of secondary schools, a member of the board of education, parent representatives from each secondary school, coaches of junior high sports and the director of athletics. The superintendent and assistant superintendent of schools are ex-officio members.

The constitution provides that the athletic director shall be chairman of the board. Definite duties are also set up for the various representatives.

Duties of the athletic director are to present a budget for expenditures for the fiscal year by April 1; present in writing the year's schedules for each sport and to present, in writing, to the principal of each school, recommendations for letter awards.

The board chairman is to preside at all meetings; carry on correspondence necessary to the athletic program; approve all equipment regulations; keep principals informed concerning all phases of athletic program, notify members of meeting times; and provide men for policing grounds, reserve seat sections and parking of cars.

IN ADDITION, each coach is supposed to present in writing to the athletic director, criticism concerning officials; submit in writing his requests for letter awards and advise athletic director in making the annual budget.

The board of education member is responsible to present the views of the board of education to the athletic board, and in turn, keep the group informed of the activities and attitudes of the athletic board.

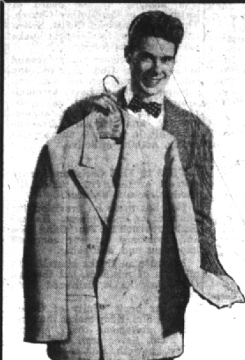

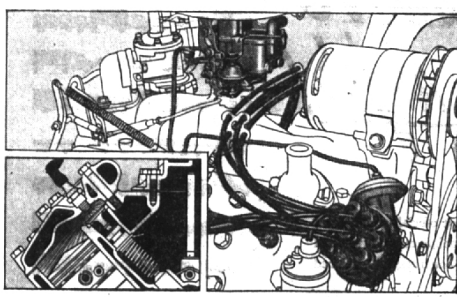
