

Garbage, Rubbish Articles Approved By Southfield Twp.

Articles of incorporation of the Southfield township garbage and rubbish authority were approved by the Southfield township board Tuesday evening.

Supervisor D. P. Frame pointed out he believed it the only logical thing to do because the township is growing and there is a constant need for garbage and rubbish disposal. He said the township is now paying at least \$100 a month to dump rubbish.

A \$250 appropriation to cover township civil defense expenditures until April 1 was approved. Deadline without penalty, for the Cornell special assessment district was extended to April 12.

AUTHORIZATION to purchase a new fire station site one-quarter mile west of Southfield and 13 mile road was approved. The price was \$1,500.

Harold Murphy, Democratic candidate for township supervisor, asked the board not to remove his party's slate from the primary ballot.

According to state law, if a party has a complete slate without competition in a primary election, the candidates are automatically nominated. Earlier this week he was notified that the Democratic party would not be on the primary ballot.

Murphy said it would jeopardize his party's chances in the April election if it was left off this ballot.

After considerable discussion, the board voted to place the party back on the ballot for the primary.

Rent Controls Off In Bloomfield Twp.

Rent controls were lifted in Bloomfield township Monday evening by the township board. This action will not be official, however, until approved by the federal housing expediter.

Township Supervisor David Anderson said there still is a need for more volunteers for the police and fire auxiliaries. Those interested can apply at the township offices.

The supervisor said he and other township officials will attend a civil defense meeting in Lansing Feb. 21.

Anderson also announced that the caucus to nominate candidates for all township offices will be held at the township hall Saturday afternoon, March 3.

First annual meeting of the Family Service of Oakland County will be held Feb. 21 in the Baldwin public library auditorium at 8 p. m.

Helen Ross, nationally known administrative director of the Institute for Psychoanalysis, Chicago, will speak on "The Agency and Family Life." The meeting is open to the public.

Miss Ross has done graduate work at the University of Missouri, Bryn Mawr and the University of London. For five years she studied at the Institute for Psychoanalysis in Vienna where she worked closely with Alfred Freud, daughter of Dr. Sigmund Freud.

Miss Ross has played a major part in helping direct the training program for psychiatrists at the Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis for 20 years. She is also well known for her work as consultant for schools and social agencies.

THE PRESENT family service of Oakland county came about through the January, 1950, merger of the family service center (which served the Pontiac, Birmingham, Bloomfield area) and the Southern Oakland county family service association.

Estella M. Martin is executive director of the agency, three offices in Royal Oak, Birmingham and Pontiac, The Birmingham office, opened last September at 102 Pierce street, serves as administrative headquarters.

The organization offers service in relation to personal and family difficulties. Marriage strains, children's growth, adolescent conflicts, physical illness and handicaps, emotional disturbances and economic adjustments are among the problems brought to the agency.
