Southfield Teachers Schedule Revised

Revisions in the Southfield township teachers' salary schedule were adopted by the township school board Monday evening.

New minimum salary for teachers with baccalaureate degrees is \$2800, and \$3100 for those with master's degrees. Former minimums were \$2700 and \$2900.

Superintendent Glenn Schoenholz said top salaries in each bracket will now be \$4300 and \$4400.

Board members discussed a possible appeal of Judge Frank I. Doty's decision that the Southfield township board does not have to pay the school board \$17,212.

The judge's decision was made Monday, Feb. 8, and the school board has 30 days to appeal. Because one board member is away on business, it was decided to withhold any action until he returns.

City Air Spotters Man Post Well As State Test Fails

Birmingham air spotters were among the comparative few to make their observation posts during last weekend's practice.

Throughout the state, defense officials report, the test was a failure. Less than a third of the 800 posts were manned, an Air Force officer reported, and low flying bombers could have taken nearly any point in the state with little or no interference.

Richard Dewey, chief observer for this area, kept the post man-

ned at all times during the test. Capt. Louis Blanchet, head of the Grand Rapids filter center, said the 300 persons on duty there had little to do.

"AT LEAST 275 posts did not open up," he said. "There were many planes in the air but few were reported to us. I sincerely hope something can be done to make the public realize the importance of these tests. Alert ground observers are extremely important and there must be pinpoint accuracy and cooperation."

"Many of our reports were useless because other posts failed to report and the progress of a plane was unaltered."

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Rezoning Hearing Continued Again

A hearing on the rezoning of four blocks bounded by Hunter, Hayes, Adams and Webster was continued until next week when it is expected a final commission will be present.

Commissioner Milton F. Mallerer was ill Monday night and Commissioner Chad R. Ritchie disqualified himself from voting on a certain portion of the rezoning because he owns property in the affected area.
