

Local Tankmen Down Hazel Park

The Maple tankmen swam to their sixth victory of the season last Friday, downing Hazel Park 45-36 in the Vikings' home pool. The Parkers took an early lead when Jim Alsworth set a new Hazel Park school record in the 40 yard freestyle, swimming the distance in 20.2. Bill Nisham followed with a first in the 100 yard breast stroke to keep the Vikings in the lead.

THE TIDE TURNED in the next event when Don Goldsmith and Bill Anderson finished one, two in the 200 yard freestyle to hand the Maples a lead which they did not relinquish. Goldsmith's time of 2:17.1 established a new Hazel Park pool record. Birmingham's 180 yard medley relay team consisting of Jerry Fletcher, Dick Spademan, and Marc Joelyn set another pool record with a time of 1:54.0. Joelyn also tied the pool mark for the 100 yard freestyle clocked at 15.2.

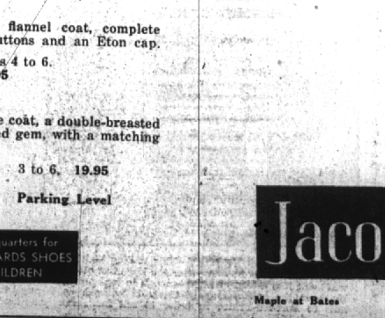
