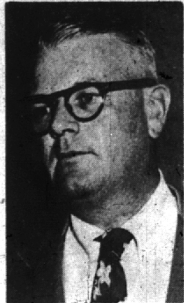


PTA Anniversary Recalls "Roaring '20s"
