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Troy Twp. Board Adopts Tighter Building Rules

Building regulations in Troy township were tightened some what at the Feb. 7 township board meeting as two new ordinances were adopted.

One requires building permit applicants to show they have suitable and adequate driveway culverts installed.

The other increases minimum capacity for septic tanks in the township from 120 to 500 gallons. Board members pointed out that the former township ordinance was old and the state health department recommends 500 gallons as the minimum requirement.

The board purchased full insurance on the township hall for the next three years from the Schultz Insurance agency of Clawson. The building is covered for \$46,000 and contents for \$6,000.

BARNARD SAID the board is considering this matter and at the next regular meeting will determine whether a township vote is necessary to appropriate the needed funds.

A special meeting Feb. 20, will canvass votes of the Feb. 19 primary election. At this session bids will be taken for the painting of the water tank and stand pipe and the purchase of 200 feet of 1 1/2-inch fire hose.

An application from the Clawson YFW post to hold a carnival at 15 Mile and Rochester roads in April was approved.
