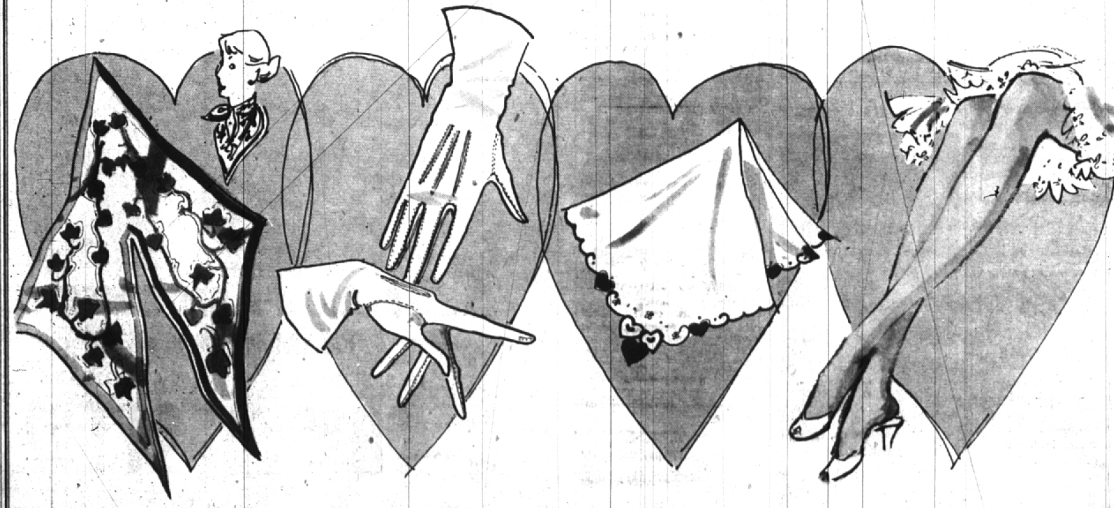
Ruth Shain International Relations Class
