Other members of the panel, which will have Dr. Robert W. Kelso as moderator, will be Dr. May and Pleasant Ridge civil defense director, and Harry Becker, biology at Henry Ford hospital; AAUW-CIO social security department director for three years.

HE ALSO HAS served as national president of Sigma Delta Chi, journalism fraternity and has been active in civic affairs in Birmingham. In addition he has been one of the directors of Kingswood and Cranbrook schools.

Request Received For Zoning Change In Southfield Twp.

A request for rezoning of a 320-acre parcel between North-western, Evergreen and Nine mile, was heard by the Southfield township zoning board Thursday evening, Feb. 1.

Officers of the Washington Village civic association asked for changing of the minimum requirements for residences in that area from 10,000 to 12,500 cubic feet to better conform with other homes. The present zoning is Residence three and the request is for Residence four.

Joseph Rankin, board secretary, said date of a public hearing to consider this matter will be set as soon as an attorney can draw up the material. He pointed out that most nearby homes are now well over 15,000 cubic feet.
