

Community House Winter Program Starts Jan. 22

Three new classes, intermediate bridge, intermediate square dancing and Mrs. J. Vinton Birch's painting class have been added to the current program of the adult education classes. The winter season will open at the Community House on Monday, Jan. 22.

making for television broadcasts. Three painting classes are scheduled for the season. On Mondays and Thursdays, from 8 to 10 p.m., Maurice Licht will conduct classes. Tuesday classes, under the direction of Mrs. J. Vinton Birch will be held from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

Mrs. John Foster will conduct two classes in pottery. One group will meet Monday evenings from 7 to 10, the other from 1 to 4 p.m. each Tuesday afternoon.

An advanced class in silver-smithing will be taught by Mrs. Wilbur Anderson from 9 a.m. to noon each Wednesday. The groups of beginners will meet Wednesdays from 1 to 4 p.m., with the intermediate students working the same evenings from 7 to 10.

SLIP COVERING and drapery making will be under the direction of Mrs. Herbert Flemington, with classes meeting from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. each Tuesday.

Mrs. Lee E. Brennan will replace her husband as instructor in square dancing. These sessions will be held from 8:30 to 10 p.m. each Monday. This class, for intermediate students, is one of the new courses offered this winter.

Fridays, from 1 to 4 p.m., has been scheduled as the meeting time for the weaving classes. Mrs. Nellie Sargent Johnson is the instructor.

In addition to these classes the Community House is sponsoring three classes which are to be given by the Oakland county chapter of the American Red Cross.

FIRST AID will be taught each Tuesday from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.; home care of the sick from 2 to 4 p.m. Thursdays and mother and baby care from 7 to 8 Thursday evenings.

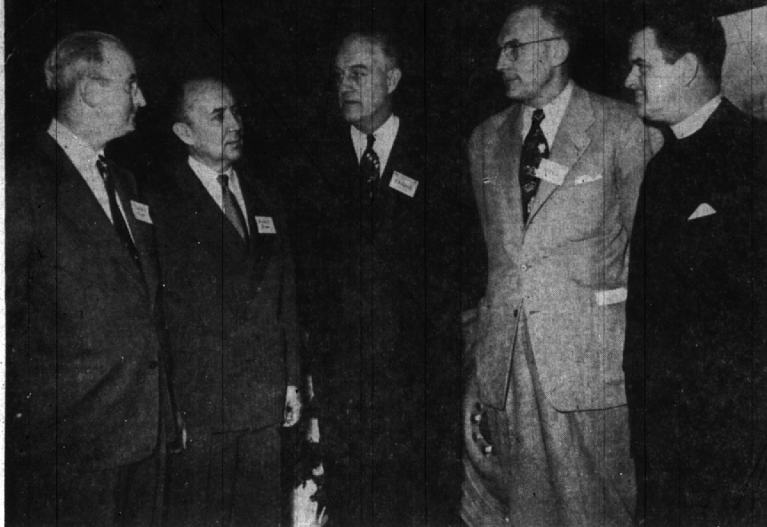
