

Pipe Line Company Requests Rental Of City Property

City Manager Donald C. Egbert will talk with representatives of the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Co. regarding that company's request to rent a section of city property in the southeast section of the city for use as a metering station.

The company desires a site 50 by 100 feet for a station. Egbert has recommended that the easement and site for the metering station be on a lease arrangement at an annual rate rental of \$100.

The Southeastern Michigan Gas Co. has also requested permission to construct a 12-inch steel pipe line to transmit natural gas from the present station at 14 Mile road and Edgewood to Fort. Hiron. A portion of this pipe line would be located along the city limits at the southeastern and northeastern sections of Birmingham.

The city commission instructed Egbert to prepare a contract giving the easement along the city property affected.

He did recommend that the commission determine the necessity for the alley and plan its location, and that no further action be taken until such time as development of the property adjacent to the alley warrants such action.

The matter was turned over to the city plan commission for ultimate advisability of the alley.

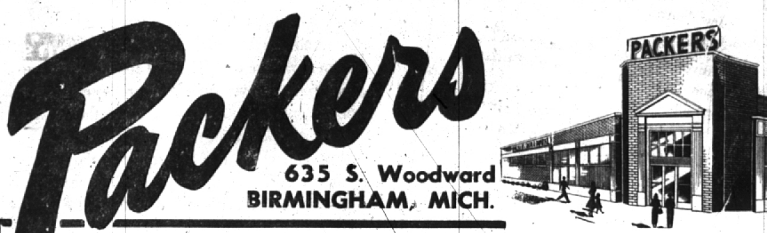
A request was also received from W. E. Mosher, Jr., 810 Harmon that the city consider the
