

Dr. R. H. Fifield To Address Public Meeting Tonight

Dr. Russel Hunt Fifield, associate professor of political science at the University of Michigan, will speak at a public meeting, sponsored by the American Association of University Women, tonight, January 11, 8 p.m., at the Community House.

Dr. Fifield, a specialist in international relations with Eastern countries, will speak on the topic, "Recent Trends in the Far East."

The public is urged to hear Dr. Fifield, with a special invitation to high school students and anyone interested in current developments in international relations.

IN 1945, DR. FIFIELD was assigned to the Consulate General at Hankow where he was occupied with economic reporting on conditions in Central China, entailing travel to the principal cities of the area.

During 1947 he spent two months in Formosa shortly after the revolt against the Chinese and was able to observe the effects of the Japanese regime and program of the Chinese Government.

Since Dr. Fifield is present on an assignment for the State Department, there will be no question period following his lecture.
